We have not yet had a reply from the Foreign Office letter of 16 Oct. ('04) No. 12888c.) suggesting that S.O. should be asked to arrange for £400,000 to be made available for the expenses of the expedition. Now the S.O. demands £400,000 for the expenses of their forces up to the end of Dec. We have no funds to meet the necessary amount.

Sir,

With reference to the Expeditionary Forces despatched from India to German East Africa and British East Africa, respectively, I am directed to suggest, for the consideration of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that, pending the final adjustment of accounts between Imperial and Indian funds in connection with these expeditions, advances towards re-imbursement of expenditure incurred from Indian funds should be made to this Office from time to time. Similar advances have already been made by the War Office in respect of the Force despatched from India to Europe, and further periodical advances on account of that expedition are in contemplation. In the case of the forces sent to East Africa, it is presumed that the Colonial Office will be the channel of payment.

As you are no doubt aware it has been decided, with the sanction of both Houses of Parliament, that Indian revenues shall bear the "ordinary" and Imperial revenues the "extraordinary" charges in respect of the expedition sent to Europe, and Parliament will be asked to sanction a similar arrangement as regards the troops sent to German and to British East Africa. It will be seen from the telegram of 2nd November of which a copy is enclosed, that the "extraordinary" cash outlay by the Government of India on

COPY TELEGRAM FROM VICEROY, DATED 2nd NOVEMBER 1914.

Your telegram dated 27th October. Expeditionary Forces "B" and "C". Following is rough estimate of cash outlay in India to end of December recoverable from Imperial Government neglecting the value of stores &c. not requiring early replacement Figures for Force "B" are as follows:-

recurring £75,000 Principal Heads are Supply £43,200, Pay £20,700, Other heads £11,100 Initial £22,500,

Principal heads are Marine Transport, £160,000, Supply £16,300, Inland movements £19,000, Miscellaneous including Railway requirements £23,600, Other heads £6100, total Initial and Recurring £300,000.

Figures for Force "C" are as follows:- recurring £33,000, Principal Heads are Supply £20,000, Pay £8000, Other heads £5000 Initial £87,000. Principal heads are Marine Transport £62,000, Supply £12,200, Inland Movements £7000, Other heads £6000; total Initial and Recurring £120,000. For both Forces the total is £420,000 and an advance of £400,000 might be claimed from the War Office.
