Sir,

In 1898 and 1899 some correspondence took place between Sir A. Hardinge and the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs on the question of the inland boundary of the Sultan of Zanzibar's mainland dominions, and it would appear from Sir F. Bertie's letter to Mr. Cave of April 26th 1899 that the demarcation of the Kilakwa boundary would possibly affect the question. I have therefore the honour to request that I may be furnished with copies of such papers as may be of use in deciding the boundary in East Africa as this is necessary for the purposes of the Land Titles Ordinance in order to decide how far in the interior Extramedian law is applicable.

M. I do not at all agree with Sir A. Hardinge's contention that the boundary should follow the indentations of the Coast, and I fully endorse Sir J. A. M'Ghie's statement of September 26th 1898 (enclosed in the Marquess of Salisbury's despatch No. 261 of that year) that any claim of the Sultan of Zanzibar to a frontier at a distance of ten sea miles from the extremities of the creeks is little short of preposterous.
