Bast Africa Protectorate Railway to Lake Magadi

Gentlemen,

As it is hoped to shortly commence the construction of the above Railway, we, as Consulting Engineers to the Magadi Soda Company, Ltd., who are building the line, write in connection with the permanent way material, etc. to be shortly purchased and sent out.

The rails, as you are aware, are to weigh 50 lbs. per yard for about the first 26 miles and 80 lbs. per yard for the remainder of the distance. We propose that the rails and fishplates should be to the British Standard Specification and design.

The rails in the main line are to be laid on steel sleepers and we hand you herewith Drawing No. 9012 B. showing the sleeper to be used for the 50 lbs. rail and Drawing No. 9013 B. showing the sleeper we propose for the 80 lbs. rail. In order to save time, we shall be obliged if you will let us know to what specification these sleepers should be manufactured.

As it is advisable that the points and ordssings should be, with regard to the 50 lbs. rails, identical with those on the Uganda Railway, we should be glad to show if

I have the honour to forward for your information a copy of correspondence between the Magadi Soda Company, their consulting engineers, and ourselves.

2. You will see from our letter to the Company our view of the situation. In our opinion it is undesirable, as tending to cause future complications, that we should approve proposals or furnish information to the Company, unless upon any specific points you instruct us to do so. The contract places the approval of all proposals in the hands of the General Manager. It follows therefore that any information at this stage should be obtained from him. I would add that it appears desirable that there should be available to the contractors only one source of information, which should be the one indicated by the contract. Any arrangement under which the contractors obtain part of their instructions from one source and part from another must tend to confusion and loss of time.
