Sir:-

I am directed by Secretary Sir Edward Grey to transmit to you herewith a copy of a despatch from His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General at Zanzibar proposing the grant of a small allowance to the wives of Zanzibar officials who accompany their husbands on leave of absence by the Union Castle Line.

While Sir E. Grey does not desire to alter the basis of existing practice he feels that in the circumstances Mr. Clarke's proposal is not unreasonable but before giving it his sanction he would be glad to learn whether a similar allowance is made to the wives of officers in the service of the East Africa and Uganda Protectorates.

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit herewith a copy of a memorial which has been addressed to the First Minister by the officers of the superior staff of the Zanzibar Government asking that something may be done to relieve them of the extra expense of the passages home of their wives to which they will be put in consequence of the decision conveyed to me in your despatch No. 226 of the 14th ultimo that they must travel by ships of the Union Castle line.

The return first class net fares to London via cardinals by the various steam ship lines are as follows.

 French mail which makes a considerable difference  
 the petty expenses of a voyage.

I feel sure that you will agree with me in think-  
 ing that it would be unfair that by compulsory order  
 the Government an extra burden should be thrown up-  
 on the shoulders of the Zanzibar officials, few of who  
 could afford to bear it, and I therefore venture to  
 propose that the sum of ten pounds for a return journey  
 five pounds for a single journey be granted towards  
 the passage of the wife of an official travelling with  
 her husband when he proceeds on ordinary leave of  
 absence.
