I am directed by Secretary Sir Edward Grey to state that Mr. Corbett Davis of the Zanzibar Government Service has arrived in England on leave of absence.


Mr. Corbett Davis states that he travelled from Zanzibar by the Union Castle Line in accordance with the recent agreement and that his journey has taken twenty-seven days whereas had he come by the French Line his passage would have taken eighteen days.

Mr. Davis' leave begins from his departure from Zanzibar and in view of the length of time which his passage to England has occupied, Sir E. Grey proposes to grant him an extra ten days leave, but before doing so he would be glad to learn what is done in similar cases of officers in the East African Protectorates.
