Secretary Sir Edward Grey has had under his consideration your letter 38986/1910 of the 3rd of January last respecting the proposed annexation of the British East Africa Protectorate as a British Possession.

I am directed by Sir E. Grey to state in reply, for the information of Mr. Secretary Harcourt, that His Majesty's Government are debarred by the Declaration of March 10th 1862 signed with France from annexing the mainland possessions of the Sultan of Zanzibar, and that, even if that Declaration were annulled, it would be necessary, in view of the Agreement of July 1st, 1890 with Germany, if the annexation of British East Africa were decided upon, to insert a proviso reserving all the just rights of the Sultan of Witu.

It will be for Mr. Harcourt to consider whether the proposed annexation of the remainder of the Protectorate is desirable in view of the limitations imposed by the Treaty engagements above referred to in regard to the ten mile strip and Witu and Sir E.
