Pressing.

Sir:-

I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to state for  
the information of Mr. Secretary Harcourt that the Acting  
British Agent and Consul General at Zanzibar reports that  
the Sultan of Zanzibar has suggested that on the occasion  
of the Coronation prisoners undergoing sentence in the  
Sultanate should be granted remissions of their sentences.

It appears that, at the time of the Coronation of His  
Majesty King Edward VII, a certain number of native  
prisoners were released and the sentences of others reduced.  
Up there is no record of what was done in the special case  
of prisoners sentenced by the British Court on that  
occasion.

The Zanzibar Government recommend that the same course  
in this respect should be followed in the Sultanate as  
is adopted in the British East African Protectorate, and  
I am accordingly to enquire whether it is proposed that

in that Protectorate.
