


procedure in the event of any future modifications in the

mouth of the River.

Monsieur le Ministre,

I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that, as a result of the negotiations which have taken place in consequence of the alteration in the mouth of the Juba River, with a view to determining the present frontier between British East Africa and Italian Somaliland at the river mouth, I am authorized by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to state that His Majesty's Government recognize the Sovereignty of Italy over the spit of land at the mouth of the river, situated between the old channel and the new one, on the understanding that the proprietary rights of individuals shall be respected and that in the event of further changes taking place in the river mouth, the north bank of the mouth, with all the territory to the north of it, shall belong to Italy, and the south bank, with all the territory to the south of it, to Great Britain.

This recognition of Italian Sovereignty is made without prejudice to the question of principle involved.

Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Note of July 8th formulating the declarations of His Britannic Majesty's Government regarding the determination of the Anglo-Italian frontier at the mouth of the Juba River - declarations of which I have taken note with great satisfaction.

In conformity with them, it is understood that His Britannic Majesty's Government recognise the sovereignty of Italy over the spit of land at the mouth of the Juba River, lying between the old and the new course of the river, reserving proprietary rights of individuals which shall be respected, it being at the same time agreed that, in the event of further changes in the river mouth, the left bank of the mouth, with the territory behind it, shall belong to Italy and the right bank, with the territory behind it, to Great Britain.



Signor Ambasciatore,

In conformità ad esse, resta inteso che il Governo di Sua Maestà Britannica riconosce la sovranità dell'Italia sulla lingua di terra alla foce del fiume Piuba situata tra l'antico corso ed il nuovo con riserva di diritti di proprietà dei privati che saranno rispettati e nell'attesa che nel caso di ulteriori spostamenti nella foce del fiume, la sponda sinistra della foce, col territorio retrostante, aparterà all'Italia e la sponda destra, col territorio retrostante, aparterà alla Gran Bretagna.
