Sir:-

With reference to your letter of the 26th September (No. 37006), and to previous correspondence, on the subject of the application by the Magadi Soda Company for support by His Majesty's Embassy at Tokyo, I am directed by the Board of Trade to offer the following observations for the consideration of Sir E. Grey.

The practice hitherto pursued by the Board has been to advise against assistance being given by His Majesty's Embassies and Legations to British subjects proposing to set up in foreign countries manufacturing works whose products would compete with the products of British home labour. It is true that the present proposal relates to the establishment in Japan of works to deal with a raw material, which is of British Colonial origin, and that (as pointed out in the Colonial Office letter of the 20th

September,

20th September, copy of which is enclosed in your letter under reply) the establishment of the proposed works would assist the development of British territory. But on the other hand it is to be observed that there is a large export of Soda products from the United Kingdom to Japan, which might be adversely affected by the operations of the said Company there, and further, that the aim of the Company (as stated in Sir C. MacDonald's despatch) is to utilise cheap labour in that country, and to obtain customs drawbacks, in order to develop an export trade thence which would compete with British trade in other important markets also.

I am further to observe that the Board have grave doubt as to whether the interests of the Company can be regarded as "British" in the same sense as those of firms which, like those mentioned in Sir C. MacDonald's despatch, employ British labour for manufacturing purposes; but I am to point out that in the present instance there is no question of any differentiation against a colonial company, since the Board would have given the same advice had the application emanated from a Company in the United Kingdom.

The Board consequently feel unable to modify the recommendation, contained in their previous letter, that the action taken by Sir C. MacDonald should be approved; but, should Sir E. Grey for any reason not see fit to concur in this course, and should authorise a formal introduction to the Japanese authorities, they trust that no active support will be given by His Majesty's Embassy to the Company's proposed application for a drawback on export.
