The present iron lands ordinance of the East Africa Protectorate is dated the answer to the first question is the 1st October 1902; the ordinance is at present under revision and is stated in my reply to the hon. member for Newcastle under Lyme on the 30th March. The policy which the Government has been instructed to follow contemplates the grant of leases for 99 years with a revision of rent at the end of the

from the 1st of Jan¹ 1906 to the 30th
of June 1910 will be found appended
to the reports on the Protectorate
for Nos. 6 and the subsequent years,
which have been presented to
Parliament. During the half year
ended the 31st Dec¹ 1910, <sup>(the amount which has not yet been
paid up, which has not yet been
returned)</sup> such grants were made.]

[The new tenure can be, and doubtless
will be, enforced by Rules under the
old ordinance pending the introduction
of the new one ordinance, in case Mr.
Guinness raises the point. Our difficulty
is that we don't yet know what precise
steps Sir P. Girouard has taken
since he arrived.

The SECRETARY OF STATE for the
COLONIES Mr HARCOURT. The answer
to the first question is that, as of October
1st, 1858, the sum of £100000 was ac-
corded to the Government of Canada so that
that and successive years that your
agents of the Indian Affairs from the
1st January, 1859 to the 1st of Jan-
uary, 1860, to be paid up to the re-
port on the preference bill 1860 and
the subsequent years which have been
presented to Parliament. During the
half year ended the 31st of December
1860 the return for which has not yet been
published, £250000 were paid.

allow the right to raise the rent at the
