Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Fiddes' letter of the 11th ultimo, (39355/1910) further respecting the grant of a compassionate gratuity to Mrs. Saxton.

In reply I am to request you to inform Mr. Secretary Harcourt that upon reconsideration of all the circumstances My Lords have come to the conclusion that a claim for special treatment may be made for Mrs. Saxton on the ground that it will not apparently be clear until two years have elapsed whether she has herself contracted the disease from which her husband died, and that she will during this period be under medical observation. These facts must doubtless militate against her capacity to earn a livelihood, and in consideration of this My Lords sanction, as a quite exceptional case, the grant of a gratuity to Mrs. Saxton equal in amount to a year's salary of her late husband.

My Lords would suggest for the consideration of Mr. Harcourt, whether it would not be advisable, instead of paying the grant in one sum, to disburse it in instalments extending over the period of two years during which Mrs. Saxton is to undergo medical inspection.
