## Liberation of slaves in Jutland

Suggest that sum of £500 may be allotted  
for liberation of captive slaves in Jutland and  
of the balance £500 of the sum of £1000  
granted for liberation of slaves within the British Isles

Then the estimates for 1911-12 were framed at  
the amount of £1000. The total expenditure on compensation  
for 1910-11 was estimated at £26,100 but of this sum  
£10,000 originated provided by the Treasury. I do not  
know what in the estimates for 1911-12 they have intended  
to spend of £1000 to complete the sum originally

intended. It would be very desirable that the Government  
should be compelled to exceed up to £500 of the unspent  
balance in providing difficulties over draft legislation

However, it should be a necessary condition of such legislation  
that the compensation should be granted in account  
of the expenses incurred in obtaining a full copy in form of a  
full interview and expenditure on travelling may turn out to be  
larger than the original anticipations and they in my case

I think we had better do it, and ourselves by sending the  
treasury a copy of this letter had saying that the secretary

Sir,

I beg to inform you that upon the occasion of my visit to Jubaland last year, my attention was called to the fact that a certain number of slaves were held by the various Somali tribes.

With the abolition of the legal status of slavery within the Coastland Dependencies of the Sultan of Zanzibar, His Majesty's Government placed at the disposal of the Government of the Protectorate the sum of £10,000 for the redemption of slaves - a process which has been going on for some few years, and has now been nearly completed.

The average price paid for the redemption of slaves has been £6,13.4 - a sum which has by no means contented the masters, but it has nevertheless been accepted. The number of slaves within the Somali country cannot exceed a few hundred, and it would appear desirable to place these owners upon the same basis as the Arab or Swahili of the Coast Strip - more particularly as the cessation of these slaves from their masters might, in the case of the fanatical Somalis, lead to serious disturbance.

of the sum of £240,000 granted for the liberation of slaves within the Coast strip, £12,500 still remains to be expended. This sum it is estimated will suffice for the purpose, and there may even be a small balance to the credit of the Vote.

Though Somali claims for compensation cannot be dealt with in bulk, it is essentially desirable that the Provincial Commissioner of the Jubaland Province should have it within his power to pay for the redemption of those who may desert their masters. The sum involved for the liberation of such slaves is an insignificant one, but the principle or consequences much more important. I would therefore suggest that ~~one~~ of the remaining sum of £12,500 - a sum of £500. should be allotted for the redemption of Somali slaves, and trust this proposed course may receive early sanction.
