The practice with regard to the Uganda Railway has been the same as for the Colonies i.e. that we never place an order abroad except for special articles not procurable in this country or when some very substantial advantage in time or cost is obtained. The orders placed abroad for the Uganda Railway have for a good many years past been but few.

During construction in the 19th century a number of American locomotives were purchased on account of the engineers' strike, and also an American firm carried off in open competition by advertisement a large contract for bridges on the Mau escarpment. Possibly Mr. Hass has seen some of these locomotives and bridges. These matters were

were all settled by the long disbanded committee under the Foreign Office and may now be regarded as ancient history. In 1910, by the instructions of the Secretary of State for the Jinja-Hakinda Railway, we gave a considerable order for steel Belgian sleepers, owing to their cheapness, Mr. Haes may have seen or heard of some of these. The new engines, now being supplied, are all being built by the North British Loco. Co. No engine has been built abroad for a good many years past.

It does not seem worth while to make an exhaustive search of our records, but from memory I should say that except the Belgian sleepers that no important order has been placed abroad since construction ceased.

Certainly none has been so placed for the last four or five years. I have referred to Messrs Rendel & Robertson and they confirm this.

The above will I think enable you to answer Mr. Haes who has evidently either been misinformed or jumped to unwarranted conclusions without making enquiries.
