DEPORTATION OF MON. G. COLE

This copy of answer to petition of Pastoralists' Association praying for the rescission of the order of deportation.

Sir G. Fiddes,

I felt from Gov/37732 that Sir P. Girouard was leaving it to the Secretary of State to answer a petition which he ought to have answered himself. The reply of which a copy is enclosed in this despatch, simply corrects an inaccuracy in the petition and saves for the rest, that the petition will be forwarded to the Secretary of State. The obvious answer will be that the Secretary of State sees no reason for modifying the action which has been taken in the case of Mr. Cole. I doubt, however, whether it is worth while sending any reply now; the petitioners will have ceased to expect any. There is the less reason for replying because it appears from the enclosure in this despatch that the petition was not actually signed by all ^{the} ~~the~~ names which were appended to it. The Governor's Private Secretary described it as "a petition which I understand will be signed by all members of the Pastoralists Association".

I have the honour to inform you that I am in receipt of your letter of October 1st, enclosing a petition which I understand will be signed by all members of the Pastoralists Association.

I am instructed to inform you that His Excellency will duly forward your petition to the Secretary of State. I have, however, been instructed to draw your attention to one clause in the petition which is not accurate. I refer to the clause at the end of the first page which reads: "that no charge such as endeavouring to excite enmity &c". These last two sub-sections of section 25 are not included in the order but only the first sub-section reading: "is conducting himself so as to be dangerous to peace and good order in East Africa."
