January 31st 1912.

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch Confidential of November 24th last and note with satisfaction your general approval of the arrangements proposed in connection with the working of the Busoga Railway.

2. I regret however that exception is taken to the salary suggested for Mr. Grant Davie. The Manager reports exceptionally well on him and describes him as a hardworking, tactful and pushing assistant with an excellent knowledge of the country, the natives and the language. He considers him well worth the salary proposed and states that in all probability Mr. Grant Davie will refuse anything less and seek employment elsewhere, an eventuality which he is particularly anxious to avoid.

3. Mr. Currie states that the men sent out from home on £300 per annum have not as a rule proved successful.

4. I feel bound to support the Manager most strongly in this matter, as I know that he is most unlikely to incur any unnecessary expense and his recommendations are always made in the

interests of economy and efficiency. I think with him that it would be most unfortunate if for the sake of a few pounds per annum we lost the services of a really suitable man and I trust therefore that you will find it possible to reconsider the matter and allow Mr. Grant Davie's commencing salary to stand at £375 as originally suggested.

5. He is at present on leave in England and I should be glad if you would inform him without delay of any decision arrived at in regard to his appointment. I should also be glad to receive a cablegram in reply to his despatch in order that the necessary arrangements may be made in the event of Mr. Grant Davie leaving the service.
