With reference to your despatch No. 79 of the 8th ultmo, I have the honour to observe that the scale of salary for Provincial Commissioners recommended for the sanction of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury is £500 by £25 to £700, with a duty allowance of £50.

2. I would respectfully suggest that, before a decision as to the rate of salary to be allotted to these officers is finally come to, Sir Percy Girouard's views on the subject may be obtained. From conversations which I have had with him, I have a distinct impression that he considers £600 the minimum rate of pay which should be drawn by officers of the grade of Provincial Commissioner. The £500 minimum scale rate is the same as the maximum proposed for the District Commissioners' scale, and there appears to be insufficient differentiation between the two classes of appointment, the importance and responsibilities of which are by no means on a par. I believe Sir Percy Girouard to hold the opinion that there should be a very marked distinction between the pay of the two posts, more

particularly as a Provincial Commissioner in many stations is put to very considerable expense in the way of entertainment - a charge on his purse which has hitherto been recognized by the grant of an allowance but is now, except in the case of the officer stationed at Mombasa, no longer so adjusted.

3. I would further point out that on the 1st proximo, after allowing for the promotion of Messrs. Hope and Salkeld, there will be no less than 16 District Commissioners with five years' service in that rank who would therefore be drawing the maximum salary of their grade, namely £500 per annum, and the scale of £400 to £500 been in force when they were appointed to their present posts. The majority of these officers cannot expect promotion for a considerable time and therefore when the incremental system of salaries has ^{been} ~~is~~ ^{in practice} for a few years the position will be that District Commissioners will rise to a salary of £500 per annum and then be obliged to wait for some years for promotion which even when earned will involve no immediate increase in their substantive pay.

4. On these grounds I would suggest that the scale of salary to Provincial Commissioners should be £600 by £25 to £700, with a duty allowance of £60. The change would only involve an addition of £280 to the 1912-13 Estimates, namely £100 each for the officers in charge of the Northern Frontier District and Jubaland and an increase of £10 to the eight duty allowances.

5. I have further the honour to report that, through inadvertence, the increments for the 3 Senior Provincial Commissioners - Messrs. Hobley, Ainsworth and Hinde - were omitted from Appendix 3 of the draft Estimates for 1912-13; and I would request authority to issue the increments as from 1st proximo. I understand that Sir Percy Girouard has taken home with him a Memorandum on the subject of the increments of these officers.

6. The proposed reduction of the duty allowance from £60 to £50 would, unless the increments are sanctioned, entail an actual loss of £10 to Mr. Hobley and Mr. Hinde as compared with the salary they are drawing at the present time, putting on one side the £50 entertainment allowance for the Provincial Commissioner stationed at Mombasa which would render existing arrangement be drawn by the latter. Mr. Ainsworth would be drawing only £40 more than at present although an additional £50 personal allowance has been sanctioned in his case.

Dear Sir Percy,

You will remember that before you left for England I handed you a memo on the subject of the personal allowances drawn by the three senior P.Cs. The point was, that I considered, and you agreed, that these personal allowances, being rewards for special services, should be treated quite apart from the ordinary salary of the grade. I have now received a despatch from the C.O. in which it is stated that it is the intention of the Secretary of State that the personal allowances should be merged in the new scales of salary. This appears to me to be very hard on Messrs Hobley, Ainsworth, and Hinde who are the officers affected.

I am writing to know whether you could possibly do anything at the C.O. to obtain the concession that the personal allowances shall be distinct from the salaries. The three P.Cs. concerned feel very bitter about it and, I think, not unreasonably so.
