Sir,

I have the honour to submit proposals regarding payment of fees by private persons for work carried out at the Nairobi Laboratory.

2. I would suggest the attached scale being adopted and would recommend that the Officer responsible for the report be entitled to draw half the fee payable in accordance with the custom which prevails at Institutions of this nature.

3. I would lay down that no fees be payable in respect of work done for any Government Department, nor for such work as would appear to be of public utility. For example where a settler sends in for analysis a sample of soil from an area about which there is no information in the records of the Agricultural Office, that such a settler would be entitled to obtain the report of the examination without payment if it was considered that such information was of value to the office concerned. But, if, for instance, a settler, next door to the foregoing, sent in a sample for analysis and was not content to accept the report on his neighbour's farm - presumably the same class of soil - he could be charged.

I would propose that, should the point arise,

The fees for the detection of poisons, analyses and consultations in connection with mineralogical, metallurgical, and engineering and other special examinations will be ~~assessed~~ in proportion to the scope of the enquiry engineering and will be fixed by arrangement with the Principal Medical Officer.

The Government Analyst should be communicated with prior to sampling except in the case of dairy products, in the sampling of which no special procedure is necessary. Samples of water must be sent in special bottles which will be supplied from the Laboratory.
