Sir,

In connection with the estimates for the year 1908-09, I have the honour to bring the following points to your notice, with the request that the necessary instructions may be obtained from the Colonial Office.

A sum of £81177 from balances on hand was sanctioned for expenditure during the current year in addition to the amount calculated on the "half and half" basis, i.e. the expenditure of the previous year plus one half of the estimated increase of Revenue.

The total sanctioned on the Estimates was £781569 and the expenditure for 1908-09 on the "half and half" basis will therefore be £781569 less £81177 plus one half the estimated increase in Revenue. To this may be added any sums revoiced, funds for the same being found from balances on hand without the grant-in-aid being affected in any way.

In addition to the Expenditure appearing in the estimates there are several items specially sanctioned from balances on hand. These are shown in Appendix C part B to the Estimates.

It is already certain that it will be impossible to spend the full amount thus sanctioned by 31st March 1908, e.g. the new Treasury Offices, which, the Director of Public Works informs me, cannot be completed within less than 20 months from the date of the commencement of the work.

I am uncertain as to how such special "request expenditure" should be treated in connection with the preparation of next year's Estimates.

There are two alternative courses:-

(1) To estimate how much will be spent by 31st March 1908 and to include the balance as revealed in a similar statement to Appendix C part B.

(2) To append to the estimates a similar statement to Appendix C part B, but treating the specially sanctioned expenditure as a liability, i.e. commencing the statement with the total shown as "balance to be placed at interest" which is shown as £70054, but which actually amounted to £75764, (vide my annual report).

The first alternative would undoubtedly be the correct one if the special expenditure appears

in the Estimates, but the Treasury made a special ruling to the effect that it was not to be so included, and I have accordingly the honour to request that the necessary instructions may be given.

The second point to be dealt with is the disposal of the balance of £75754 at present shown as "to be placed at interest".

The original intention appears to have been to keep this sum as the nucleus of a fund for future railway extension. But there is the very practical difficulty of adding to such a fund. The sum originally accrued mainly through unestimated Rail Tax and Railway Revenue and savings on Railway Expenditure, but it does not appear likely that any such contingencies will recur to any appreciable extent. Further, from recent correspondence between the Treasury and the Colonial Office, it appears possible that the requisite capital for future railway construction will be forthcoming, presumably by a special grant or loan.

On the other hand it will not be possible for the ordinary Protectorate Revenues to find funds for the completion of the Nairobi Sanitation scheme prepared by Mr. G. E. Secondly, the completion of the housing
of officials cannot be effected for some years to
come from general revenues, owing to the fact,
which has already been reported home, that we are
a long way in arrears as regards providing house
and office accommodation.

Thirdly, the Mombasa water supply, which was
included in the list of expenditure to be incurred
from a loan, is too large an item to include in our
Public Works Extraordinary Schedule unless special
funds are allowed.

I have accordingly the honour to suggest
that you should make some recommendation, well in
advance of the Estimates, as to how the £75764 can
be expended to the best advantage.
