With reference to Your Lordship's despatch No. 374

of the 16th of May last, and in continuation of my own  
despatch No. 366 of the 5th ultimo, I have the honour to  
recommend that the following appointments to date the 1st  
April 1907, should be made to the permanent and pensionable  
establishment of the Agricultural Department:-

Mr. H. Powell Chief of the Economic Plant Division.

Mr. J. L. Mill Manager of the Government Stock Farm, Naivasha.

Mr. Powell has had considerable experience of Economic

Plant Culture and is most thoroughly fitted for the post.

Prior to his engagement in this Protectorate he had held a

pensionable appointment in St. Vincent under Sir Daniel

Morris, M.C.M., for over 15 years, and I would ask that should

Your Lordship sanction his appointment he may be allowed to reckon his service towards penitentiary from the date on which he was originally temporarily employed in this Department, that is the 7th of November 1903.

3. I enclose for Your Lordship's perusal a letter which Mr. Powell addressed to the Under Secretary of State at the request of Mr. Antrobus and Mr. Read in February 1906 on this subject.

4. Mr. Hill has during the last 3 years been in charge of the Government Stock Farm at Naivasha and his management has been in every way satisfactory; he has acquired, too, during this period, a knowledge of local conditions which should prove of value in the future.

5. Both these appointments are recommended by the Commissioners of Lands and the Director of Agriculture.

Sir,

I beg to be allowed to have the honour to approach you in connection with my appointment as an Assistant in the Agricultural Department under the administration of the East Africa Protectorate, and to lay before you the following facts for your kind consideration.

2. The appointment dates from the 7th November, 1903, and under the terms of my agreement, is liable to terminate on the 6th November next.

3. I was made aware that my present appointment did not carry with it any claim to government employment beyond the East Africa Protectorate, and that I entered the service of that Protectorate, subject to all regulations affecting it which were then in force, or which may be promulgated from time to time by, or with the sanction of, the Secretary of State.

A copy of the General Regulations respecting the employment of officers in the Protectorate was enclosed with the agreement.

At the time I accepted the appointment in British East Africa, on the recommendation of Sir W. Thistleton Ows and Mr Daniel Morris, I was in charge of the Agricultural Department at St. Vincent, West Indies, where I had been similarly

I beg to be allowed to have the honour to approach you in connection with my appointment as an Assistant in the Agricultural Department under the administration of the British Africa Protectorate, which lay before you the following facts for your kind consideration.

2. The appointment dates from the 7th November, 1903, and, under the terms of my agreement, is likewise terminate on the 6th November next.

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4. At the time I accepted the reappointment in British East Africa, on the recommendation of Sir W. Whistleton and Sir Daniel Morris, I was in charge of the Agricultural Department at St. Vincent, West Indies, where I had been similarly

similarly stationed for 18½ years, and was a pensionable officer.

5. Taking into consideration the length of service in St. Vincent, and the arduous duties I had to perform in connection with the hurricane of 1896 and the volcanic eruptions of 1897, I reluctantly in accepting a change, and in doing so had confidence that, should my services in East Africa prove unuseful, there would be little likelihood of the Government terminating my appointment.

6. The Government of East Africa selected me as their representative at the recent Colonial Products Exhibition held at Liverpool, and I regard this as a mark of their confidence in my efforts to further the agricultural and commercial interests of the Protectorate.

7. In view of the foregoing remarks and the early approach of the time when my agreement is liable to terminate, I respectfully trust that you graciously and favourably consider the following:-

(A) That my appointment in East Africa be made permanent and carry with it all the privileges, including pension rights, of a Permanent Officer.

(B) That, having been entitled to pension in St. Vincent there should be no break for such time as I have already served in East Africa.

(C) Should it be decided to terminate my appointment in November next, if otherwise it may be possible to transfer my services elsewhere under the Colonial Office."

I have every confidence in the immediate prospects of British East Africa, both as regards agriculture generally and cotton cultivation, and am convinced that a continuance of the present efforts by the Government and general community of the Protectorate, will lead to very satisfactory results in the near future.
