My Lord,

I have the honour to transmit herewith for Your Lordship's favourable consideration a copy of a letter I have received from the Veterinary Bacteriologist asking that he may be allowed to terminate his appointment immediately.

Mr. Simpson's agreement is for a period of three years and he is entitled to no leave prior to the expiration of this period and he is further liable to refund the cost of his outward passage should he leave before the expiration of his agreement.

Although Mr. Simpson has so far only completed 15 months service I would nevertheless owing to the special circumstances of the case recommend that he

be allowed to terminate his appointment and that as an act of grace he should not be asked to refund the cost of his outward passage; he will of course pay for his passage home himself.

4. I am addressing Your Lordship in a further despatch on the subject of the Veterinary Bacteriological Department and should Your Lordship sanction the immediate termination of Mr. Simpson's appointment I would ask that pending the receipt of this despatch no steps should be taken to fill the appointment.

5. Arrangements can be made by the Chief Veterinary Officer and the Medical Bacteriologist for temporarily carrying on the Veterinary Bacteriological work, and as my proposals will involve the employment of an officer on a somewhat larger salary, I should be glad if Your Lordship will await a further communication before moving in the matter.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that unforeseen circumstances have arisen which render it necessary for me to place the following facts before you.

My wife has been ordered to return to England on account of ill health and an impending operation and will have to leave in November; she has been medically advised that East Africa is unsuited to her health and will not return.

This being the case, would you kindly inform me if it would be possible for His Excellency to release me from my duties here period of service expires, or, failing this, would it be possible for me to obtain leave of absence in April 1908?

I was informed by the Colonial Office that my period of service would count from the day I left England (August 11th 1906) and that my three months in the Transvaal would also count in my service; in that case I shall be entitled to four months leave of absence in April provided the exigencies of the service permit.

My own wish would be to terminate my appointment as soon as my successor would be appointed; but, the expense that this resignation entails will not permit me to do so. Under these circumstances may I ask you to kindly place the facts before His Excellency for His favourable consideration?

I desire to point out that my continuance here will entail keeping a home for my wife and family in England and supporting myself here-expense, which in conjunction with that of bringing them out and sending them back within 6 months is not possible. For the same reason, my resignation is impossible.

Under these circumstances I beg respectfully to lay these special facts before you in the hope you will be able to submit them to His Excellency for his favourable consideration.
