I regret to learnt that Mr. Currie now tells me that
 and that a deficit in the earnings of the Railways
 for the present year, as compared with the estimate, will
 probably amount 186,000, i.e. that the net earnings will
 hardly exceed 265,000 as against the estimated amount of 451,000.
 This is mainly due to the delay in bringing into service
 the affected at the expense from the State Roads, and

At present we are taking all steps possible to reduce expenditure by taking off one weekly train and making

reductions in the staff, where they can be effected without

hindrance to train service, in order to keep the deficit

down to the amount I have now.

I have discussed the matter with the Treasurer and he strongly urges my taking Your Lordship's allow this

anticipated deficit to be met from our accumulated balances,

otherwise we should have to shut down expenditure on all

Departments at a time when it will be most inconvenient to

do so, considering we are devoting a good deal of attention

to the extension of our technical departments so needed by

the country, and Mr. Horning points out if we do not

draw on our accumulated balances to meet this deficit

there will be a waste of power, and we should leave a

large staff drawing pay without the means to carry on

their work.

6. May I invite Your Lordship's earnest consideration

to this proposal, to which I trust you will
give your approval.
