My Lord,

I have the honour to submit for Your Lordship's consideration two applications I have received for compensation from Mr. Humphry the District Commissioner Mumtia, and Mr. F. F. Tonne the Acting District Commissioner Rethu, for the loss of their horses. I was at first inclined to consider that these claims should not be entertained as likely to establish inconvenient precedents, but on reconsideration I have come to the conclusion that it would be hard to make these young officers suffer for losses incurred during the execution of their duty, though they were not forced to keep horses, and I therefore submit the question for favourable consideration. The following are the circumstances:-

During the Lukumi patrol, reported in my despatch

No. 515 of November 28th, it was necessary to move as quickly as possible, and Mr. Humphrey considered it advisable, and I think rightly so, to take his horse with him. During the night of April 28th the horse, whilst standing in long wet grass after a very hard day in difficult country, contracted a chill which subsequently developed into pneumonia from which it died on June 1st.

The results of this patrol, as expected, were most satisfactory, and the Indians are now quiet and peaceable.

Mr. Horne's application is based on similar grounds. In September last it was reported that a section of the Muzai had started, along the Kitchis route, on a raid into the Araya mountains.

The Provincial Commissioner was informed by telegram, and Mr. Horne was notified by special runners.

In the former district in the Paria Valley, adjoining the recently occupied Esdu district used, in former days to be a favorite raiding ground of the Mazai, Mr. Horne

rode out with a force of Police, and hastily proceeded to that district to assist the natives in repelling an attack.

Although no ~~attack~~ took place I consider Mr. Torne's action in hurrying to the assistance of the natives was the right one to take as it is important to impress on natives who pay hut tax, and more particularly those like the Embere with whom we have only just recently come into touch, that the government is always ready to protect.

M. Numby's claim is for £50, that of Mr. Torne for £75-10s. Would Your Lordship agree that the claim may be admitted I would propose that they be met from the proceeds of the battle of sold at the conclusion of the Igumti patrol.
