My Lord,

I have the honor to refer to the case of Mr. C. Wise,  
Assistant District Commissioner which formed the subject  
of the correspondence ending with Your Lordship's despatch

No. 108 of August 2nd 1907. I have not yet been able to  
dispense with the services of Mr. Wise and he is in fact still  
stationed at Shimoni though he will be relieved at the  
end of this month. I had understood that this would  
not affect the amount of his pension but I regret  
to have to report that in this respect a mis-  
calculation was made; the fact that Mr. Wise would  
meanwhile have earned six months' leave having been  
overlooked. The addition of this period brings Mr.  
Wise's total service up to 17 years or with allowance

He is receiving a small grant of land and is anxious  
to start cultivating it as soon as possible.
