Dear Sirs,

Ref. MAP 124 9th April 1907.

We beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, reference as above, and are obliged for the same.

We are sorry to note the view of the Secretary of State in this matter, and should like to think that his decision is not irrevocable.

We are writing to Mr. Hirtzel, the Concessionnaire, asking him to inform us of the circumstances which led him to think that goods in connection with the Nairobi Electric Power and Lighting Company's scheme would be carried up at agricultural rates, and on hearing from him will communicate further with you; but in the meantime would ask that the Secretary of State should reconsider the matter in the light of the fact that this Company is a pioneer Company, and that although it is, of course, intended to bring profit to its shareholders, still the fact of its being there should be a considerable advantage to the Township and District of Nairobi. Further, may we point out that at the end of a certain term the Government has the option of taking over the concern at a prescribed price, and that in arriving at this prescribed price the cost of transport would come in as a consideration.

We should like to have a personal interview with the Official concerned on the subject of this letter, if it could be conveniently arranged.
