The words I have underlined seem to
mean that Mr Smissis work, though
it has greatly increased since the
Agency was started, is not in itself
so enormous as to justify any increase
in his emoluments.

It must also be remembered that
Mr Smissis requirements are not
affected by the fact that he is a
married man with a son at school
working for Woolwich & the R.E. (see p.
of his letter - or 28948/05).

To sum the Agency part of our
work as it stands to incur any
further expenditure, for it is a very
expensive though quite necessary
office, with cost of all
proportion to the extent of the
work which it performs.

On Mr Smissis retirement
whatever that may be, it should be
possible to reduce the present salary
of his appointment by £200 or more, & also
that of his assistant (see my
memorandum on Mr Borthwicks report
on 27/3) so I should not make
any increase in it now.

If it is considered that there is a case
for increasing it, the increase shall
be by the sum of a duty allowance
which will do, which would leave us
£200 or £250, to have the additional
allowance if we not increasing Mr Smissis
for any other emoluments.

Cost of living in Bombay.

Sir,

With reference to the question of the increased cost of living, of late years in India generally and more particularly in Bombay, I was previously ~~polung~~ ^{desirous} to give full expression to my personal opinion owing to the difficulty of obtaining positive and authoritative outside evidence of the fact, although complaints have been general for some time past and I have felt it sharply myself. I have been able to procure official testimony that it is ~~absolutly~~ beyond question and I have the honour to transmit it herewith for the information of the Earl of Elgin.-

2. A copy of the Review of the Trade of India in 1906-1907 published by the Government of India is appended and I would invite reference to the paragraph on page 78 headed "Prices" and the chart adjoining from which it will be seen that taking the year 1860 as a basis represented by 100, the mean price of 30 staple commodities has risen since 1903 from 98 to 116 in 1906. The chart shows the index numbers for the past 46 years the highest figure touched prior to 1903 being 107½ in the year 1866.-

3. I have obtained copies of the price lists published by the Superintendent of Markets by order of the Municipal Commissioner of the City of Bombay, of the 23rd of August 1904 and the 23rd August 1907 from which I have taken 80 staple articles of domestic consumption. A Table is enclosed showing the

increases in these, the mean increase amounting to say 42 %.-

4. The Secretary of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway has simultaneously favoured me with a copy of Resolution No. 48 of their Departmental Meeting No. 9 of the 21st December 1906 of which a copy is annexed.- This shows that the higher cost of living in Bombay is admitted by them and that in consequence the pay of Havildars, Naiks, Sepoys and Havaldars in their employ was increased from the 1st January 1907.-

5. A copy of Government Resolution No. 2664 of the 19th June 1907 is also forwarded showing that the Government of Bombay recognize the position and are taking action in the matter.-

6. That house rent has risen considerably has already been reported.-
