TREASURY CHAMBERS.

Sir,

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Antrebus's letter of the 1st instant (22790/1907), further respecting the proposed abolition of slavery in the mainland dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar, and I am to request you to submit to the Earl of Elgin the following reply.

2. My Lords have no desire to offer any objection to the proposal submitted, which represents the policy of His Majesty's Government, and under which—

- (1) the legal status of slavery will be abolished in September next; and
- (2) the abolition of slavery in Zanzibar will follow within the next few years.

at an estimated total cost in respect of compensation to slave owners of £40,000, of which it is anticipated that about £10,000 will be required during the current financial year.

3. Nor have Their Lordships any observations to make with regard to the machinery proposed for carrying this policy into effect, except to suggest that in order to ensure economy on the part of the Compensation Courts, a maximum amount of compensation for any one slave should be fixed

~~fixed~~ the Administration beforehand.

4. My Lords sanction the appointment of an officer to prepare a register of existing slaves at a salary of £500 a year for three years, but They think that power should be reserved to terminate his employment at (say) three months' notice, if the work progresses more rapidly than is now anticipated.

5. My Lords authorise the payment out of the general revenues of the East Africa Protectorate of any sums which the Court may award to the owners of slaves, and agree that such payments may be regarded as independent of and additional to the authorised expenditure of the Protectorate.

But They do not think it necessary, at the present stage, to give any undertaking that They will apply to Parliament for a supplementary grant to provide the necessary funds, since it may be that Protectorate's Balance will suffice to meet any payments of compensation during the current financial year.

If however it appears towards the end of the year that cash is not available for this purpose, Their Lordships will consider how the deficiency shall be made good.
