INLAND TELEGRAMS

Sir,

In continuation of my despatch of the 28th inst. I have the honour to submit for your Excellency's consideration the following proposals regarding the changes desirable in the inland telegraph charges in sequence to the adoption of a cental currency.

The present system of charging only for the words in the text of messages and transmitting the addresses feee is a somewhat antiquated they It was is operation in India at the time the Indian Telegraph Acts and rules were imported for adoption in Bast Africa, but has since been discontinued. The addresses of all ordinary telegrams are now charged for in ingle and I believe I am right in saying that British Bast Africa is practically the only country in which the system rems no in force. The granting of gree address opiosed to the international arrangements and fits in very with them, and I shall therefore glad if in connection with the revision of rates which has recome necessary the system can be abundoned and the new rates be based on the whole message, names and addresses being charged for as well as the text.

I would propose that on and from the lat of April next the rate for ordinary inland telegrams be 10 cents per word, with a minimum charge of one rupee, and for urgent telegrams the rate be 20 cents per word with a minimum charge of two rupees; the name and

I am of opinion that these alterations would have practically no effect upon the telegraph revenue. Under the present system of free addresses meanings containing a words of text and possibly words of names and address are transmitted for a rupee. a rate of 10 cents a word such a message would cost 120 cents,. In regard to short messages therefore the proposals are against the public and in favour of the revenue as in the majority of cases telegrams sent for the minimum charge (one rupee) gould contain only 6 of 7 words of text as against the E words allowed at present. For messages of average length latout 18 words 4 being in the names and address), the charge would be practically the same, viz Rs 1-12as (175 cents) under the present system and 180 cents under the proposed new scale. In the case of long messages the change would be to the advantage of the milite e.w. a message of 52 words (4 words being names and address) which at present coats Re 6 would be transmitted for Rs 5-20 cents.

In addition to bringing the system of telegraph charges of the Protectorate into line with those of the United Kingdom, and of British Colonies generally, the proposed alteration would have the effect of saving a certain amount of unnecessary work to the telegraph staff and to that extent would tend to expedite the despatch of telegrams. The system of free addresses is open to abuse, both in the purposeless writing of an unnecessarily lengthy direction and in other staff.
