For the post I submit the name of

Mr H. P. Oldham died after a few months service in S. Nigeria in 1902 was assisted Dr. C. G. Mawson, where he was reported to be "done his work exceedingly well", was sent down, & was very soon appointed to Ceylon as Ass't Superintendent of Prisons. He had asked for a leave to the English prison life if rejected. Dr. C. G. Mawson however found this difficult, and it became quite a labor. See the minutes in 22927/02, in which I am bound to call your attention to Mr. Fiddes' grave minute. There is no question that Mr. Oldham committed a most serious in his treatment of Mawson. But he is informed his chances.

I proposed on Jan 1883 B.C.A. that he be sent him to B. Africa as an administrator off. - list 5. Mr. Ormrod (see his minute) thought it hard upon Dr. Mawson to send him to West Africa, and so he was soon sent full 3 years to Ceylon in a prison which is described to be most terrible.

The heat & reacity would be quite suitable for him. There's nothing in the way of punishment, except in prison. Dr. M. Ormrod has recently, after speaking to Dr. A. Blaikie, informed us that Mr. Oldham said

Don't think the other proposal
I saw by the Govt of Ceylon refers
to Mr. Oldham's "very quiet temper,"
natural quietness of temper, & I
do not think the any amount of
caution we go to to prevent such
a case of this kind. As the Dept
Supt. & Gaoler at Durban must have
a great deal to do with native, I
think that it is particularly necessary
that we should have a reliable
one. I think that it would be
well to get a report on the
present Police & the sort.

I could only point out that the
argument against sending Mr. Oldham
to B.C.A. on account of his having
had the water fever, applies even in
the case of Durban, as the last letter

of the post who also had previous
short term service, and it has been
recommended by the underwriters
that the appointment be made
with a man who has
experience.

Sir In Answering your will remember that
on the previous occasion
you decided that it was
hardly do to send Dr Oldham
to replace an official who had
just died of black water fever.
It is obvious that on this
occasion the vacancy has
been created in the same
manner & considerable black and
white mud alone you will
will appear that it is un-
desirable to appoint Dr
Oldham. I am afraid
however that in any case
it would not be right to select
a man with Dr Oldham's
record for an appointment
of this kind. See No. 2

Sir,

With reference to your despatches No.'s 302 and
237/5
381 of July 14th and August 25th respectively on the
subject of Mr Reid's appointment as Deputy Superintendent
and Gaoler at Mombasa, I have the honour to report that
that gentleman is aware that his retention in Government
employ is in the strictest sense of the word provisional
and that he can be dismissed at a month's notice.

2. In obedience to your instructions I enclose a paper
of particulars of the post in accordance with Colonial
Regulation No. 74 together with a statement by Mr Reid
as to his qualifications.

3. With regard to the penultimate paragraph of your

despatch No 302, concerning the exceptional treatment
which was accorded to Captain Hook in consideration of
his social position, I have the honour to invite your
attention to Sir Donald Stewart's despatch No. 129 of
~~March 7th~~ in which he informed Lord Lansdowne that owing
to our having to deal with so many Europeans in the
central jail of the Protectorate it is most advantageous
to have a gentleman in charge. I am personally not yet
convinced whether Mr Reid's qualifications are
sufficiently good to warrant his permanent employm
as Deputy Superintendent of the Gaol, but while he
that appointment, it is, I consider, essential that he
should be paid the full salary allowed in the estimates
for the post and enjoy the same privileges as those
accorded to officers of the Protectorate.

Duties of Office, and qualifications required for their performance.

To take charge of the prisoners, supervise their work, and to enforce discipline. Must be of good character, social standing, and good education. Military training is very useful.

Allowance per month, and who is entitled to it, to be fixed by agreement.

Other circumstances affecting the allowances as regards leave and pension value of the Office.

As other East Africa Protectorate Officials of the Permanent Staff.

The number and amount of annuities required, and mode of payment.

Whether any and what sum is paid from public funds for the passage, from this Colony or elsewhere, of persons sent to the office.

Any ordinances making provision respecting any of the above matters, and especially respecting the permanency of the emoluments, and the particulars of the security required, with references to the sections in which such provision is made.

I have the honour to submit the following statement
with regard to my qualifications:-

- (1.) Six months service with distinction in the Bechuanaland Field Force.
- (2.) Four years and eighty days in the Cape Mounted Police, the greater portion of which I held responsible rank as Acting Intelligence Officer, No. 1 Area under General Hart, C.B., a Major and Intelligence Officer to Colonels White and Grenfell and as despatch rider.

I also held office at Burghersdorp as Chief Clerk to Commandant, and then as Assistant Press Censor. It was directed by Senior Lieutenant under Lieutenant Neeldar, D.S.O., and served in the Field under that gentleman until the conclusion of hostilities. I was appointed then Secretary to the District Commissioner Repatriation Department Johannesburg under Captain Ormanney of the Indian Police. On the closing of this Department I was appointed to the Native Affairs Department under Sir Godfrey Jagden, K.C.B. but owing to health resigned. Returning to Johannesburg I was given control of 1,300 coolies, pay allotments etc., etc.

Six months ago I was offered an appointment by Major Scott to proceed to Chin Wang Tao to take up duty under Mr. Brazier of the Foreign Labour Department but I preferred to come to East Africa.
