I have to acknowledge receipt of your letter No. 22
of the 17 June 1907 stating that the cash of £10.
has decided to pay me the salary for the period
17 Oct 1906 to 20 Feb 1907:-

Under the agreement I will receive one day's pay
£50 per annum subject to the usual deduction
in account of my travel, expenses.

If the amount of my pay is altered the agreement
ceases, and the consideration for my pay will
then be required to be a new one from which
a sum of £10 will always be deducted
by the Treasury.

Some heavy drains of sickness, making the
usual deductions for the last quarter of 1906 &
the first of 1907, had not been deducted
from my salary.

I therefore entreat you to furnish
the sum of £10.
as it is to be sent to London by bank transfer
or otherwise and the same may be
done at the earliest convenience so that my
account for the month and following month
of June can have a credit of £10.
The other alteration you have made
in respect of my part of my salary
was required I think in 1906
and will stand as it stands.
