MEMORANDUM.THE FISH PROTECTION ORDINANCE 1908.

1. Efforts are being made by certain residents in the Protectorate to introduce trout into some of the rivers of the Highlands of the Protectorate. The result of experiments go to show that there is hope that these efforts may prove successful provided that regulations can be made prohibiting the angling of small trout and the use of destructive methods of capturing trout in public waters.

At the present time the only local laws relating to the capture of fish in the Protectorate waters are those mentioned in paragraphs 3 and 4 of this Memorandum.

2. This Ordinance which is similar to the Cape Colony "Fish Protection Act 1893" confers upon the Governor the power to make rules having for their purpose the protection of all or any particular species of fish in the Protectorate waters, and prescribes the penalties which may be imposed for a breach of any such rule.

3. The Fishing Regulations 1901 require the owners of fishing boats, canoes and fishing stakes to take out annual licences. These regulations are repealed by this Ordinance but provision is made whereby they will be deemed to be rules under this Ordinance until other provision is made.

4. The East Africa Game Ordinance 1906 by Section 9 enables the Governor to prohibit the use of methods of capturing fish which appears to him to be unduly destructive.

Section 10 of the same Ordinance enacts that save as is provided by that Ordinance any person may capture any fish.

Both these Sections in so far as they relate to fish are repealed by this Ordinance.

5. This Ordinance is in my opinion one to which His Excellency the Governor may properly assent on behalf of His Majesty.
