

To the Editor,

Sir,

I see by the official report of the above incident, as published in the White Book, that Inspector General of Police Donald states in his report to His Excellency Sir James Hayes-Sadler as follows, "I have information, but of this I am doubtful, that Mr. Russell Bowker was the first to call upon His Excellency the Governor to resign at Government House." I will at once satisfy the doubtful General by stating here most solemnly and emphatically that I never called upon the Governor to resign at Government House or anywhere else, either first, second or last. As a matter of fact "I was dumb and I opened not my mouth while (His Excellency) was before me."

I trust none of my friends on reading this will for one moment think that I regret having been one of that "Rabble", or that I was not or am not still in full sympathy with their objects.

My only reason for making this public denial is my inveterate dislike to sailing under false colours, wearing borrowed plumes, or to carrying the sins of others. His Excellency and the General I suppose thought, "If a poor dog has a bad name, etc. etc."
