My Lord,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt
of Your Lordship's despatch No. 441 of the 3rd ultimo.
Lieutenant-Colonel Will, Principal Medical Officer,
will be ready to revert to Army duty on the 20th
February next.

2. I have communicated to Colonel Will Your
Lordship's appreciation of the services he has rendered
to the two Protectorates, and I shall be sorry to lose
him where he has given me the fullest support in the
administration of his Department in East Africa. He
now sees to take leave at the end of this month so
as to be able to avail himself of the leave to which
he is entitled before reverting to Military duty.

3. I recommend Dr. A. D. Milne to succeed to the
post of Principal Medical Officer in East Africa that
will be vacant by the reversion of Colonel Will.
Dr. Milne has nearly 11 years varied experience of this
part of Africa. He is professionally fully qualified
for the post, and in addition he is possessed of good
judgment and tact, and is deservedly popular with all
classes. In 1904 he was selected for the appointment
of Deputy Principal Medical Officer for East Africa
and Uganda; he has acted as Principal Medical Officer

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your
despatch No. 100 of the 2nd Oct., and to inform you that I am aware of the appointment of
Dr. A. P. Milne to the said Health Col. Will
as P.M.O. in the L.A.P.

I see no reason, however, for continuing
to pay Milne the salary offered by his
predecessor as Head of the Medical Dept. of
both the L.A.P. and Uganda. Dr Milne
should draw salary at the same rate as the
P.M.O. of Uganda, viz. £750 per annum,
increased by annual increments of £50 to £850 per
