With reference to certain communications between the Admiralty and the Colonial Office with regard to the application of certain officers of the Royal Naval Reserve at present serving on the steamers on Lake Victoria Nyanza to be allowed to count such service for promotion in the Royal Naval Reserve, I have the honour to submit that this matter may be given further consideration.

I have the honour to point out that these vessels are vessels belonging to the government of the East African Protectorate, fly the Government Flag and the Officers rank as officials of the Government.

These vessels range from 700 to 1,150 tons displacement and are circumnavigating an inland sea of some 26,000 square miles, running in conjunction with the Uganda Railway carrying passengers and goods to and from the various ports.

With two exceptions all the officers employed in this service are officers of the Royal Naval Reserve who have served for one or more years with His Majesty's fleet.

If as is stated in the Admiralty letter No. A.2617 dated 8th July 1908, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are not prepared to allow service in these vessels to count for promotion, I infer that at the end of four years service officers must either resign their commissions in the Royal Naval Reserve (vide Art:113 Royal Naval Reserve regulations) or resign from the service of the government of the East African Protectorate.

This being the case it is to be inferred that these officers will resign from the service of the East African Protectorate as most officers of the Royal Naval Reserve who have served in His Majesty's Fleet are proud of holding His Majesty's commission and have gone to a great amount of trouble and expense to obtain it and so are not likely to throw it away lightly.

This step would neither be in the interest of the East African Protectorate or of the British Empire of which the East African Protectorate forms part, as these steamers are one of the most important features of the Colony and the service can only be adequately maintained by the officers remaining in and growing with it.

I would also point out that one half of the lake shore is German territory and these officers are recognised as British Officials and are visited as such by the German authorities, Military and Civil, it is therefore important that the official status of these officers be maintained.

Again I would point out that these officers are devoting their lives to the interest of the British Empire in an extremely unhealthy part of the Empire, and the importance of the work done is infinitely greater than that of many of the so-called Protectorate armed vessels in this and other Colonies.

In the event of My Lords Commissioners being moved to reconsider their decision, I would respectfully point out that Art:103 Royal Naval Reserve regulations might be altered to read after the word "Protectorate" line 4 "or vessels belonging to the Government of ~~the~~ British East Africa employed on Lake Victoria Nyanza" or the exigency might be covered by Art: 97 clause 2.

Should My Lords Commissioners decide to reserve their former decision I have the honour to submit that these officers be authorised to wear Royal Naval Reserve uniform on state or other occasions as provided for by the King's regulations.
