Dear Dr. Brock,

With reference to our patient Mr. G.B.
Jeaffreson, I may state definitely and at once that
I fail to see any adequate reason why he should not
return to india. This opinion is based upon both
general and esscial grounds.

In the first place, several very similar cases (where however the cure has not been by any mear so complete as it is in Mr. Jeffreson's case) have returned to India and have remained there for

many years without danger to their life or decriment to their general health. With the conditions of life in India I am not very familiar, so that perhaps my experience in this direction is somewhat limited: but on the other hand I should have no hesitation in allowing him to return to the West Coast of Africa, and I can hardly believe that India is a less suitable country for such a convalescent than the West Coast.

In the second place, the various specimens of pus that I have had from Mr. Jeffreson have been 6 very carefully examined for the smooth dysenterise, but without success. His recent infection (even assuming that it was a merely terminal infection) appeared to be purely bacterial. A cartain particular stantococcus was also present in the pas, whelst

the examination of his blood showed that his power to this particular organism was practically non-existent, although quite normal with respect to numerous other pathogenic bacteria including the Bacillus of epidemic dysentery. Again the effect of the treatment which Mr. Jeaffreson has undergone has been to gradually raise his resistance towards the streptococcus alwady referred to, considerably above the normal, and this increase in resistance has gone hand in hand with improvement in general health and dinical symptoms; and now so far as the slinician is able to form an opinion (with Dr. HaleWhite) he is absolutely cured. The recent examination of a specimen of blood shows that his resisting powers against the streptococcus are still maintained at a higher level than would be found in a normal individual; so that for the present, and probably for many months to come, he is and will be less liable to a frash infection or a relapse than a person with ordinary health proceeding to India for the first time.

These I think are conclusions that would be subscribed to by any bacteriologist who is familiar with this method of treatment (that is by the insculation of therapeutic Vaccines). How fong this acquired immunity to the particular organism which I regard as responsible for his previous affection (and which was in all probability the original cause of his appendicities and subsequent trouble) will remain

efficient

ordinary care that would be exercised by one familiar with India and the conditions of life there, I repeat that I do not consider that he runs any greater risk is returning to India than a new comer would run of infection with the same organism; and anyrisk that might be present would be still further reduced if his return to India were delayed until the termination of the hot seeson.

Dear Mr. Jeaffreson.

I was greatly disappointed to hear from you that the Celonial Office has decided not to allow you to return to India. I confess I am quite unable to understand by what phain of reasoning this decision has been arrived at. I can only suppose that, while the methods of treatment which modern scientific research has placed within the grasp of medicine, have been tried to the full on you, the old tradition which declares it unsafe for a man to return to the tropics when helps once been the victim of a disease peculiar to that climate has proved too strong to be cambatted.

You will not have forgotton that at the beginning of the present year - before Dr. Eyre's vaccine treatment was suggested - that I sent a specimen of your expectoration to the Clinical Research Association, and submitted to them three questions for answer:- v\$z:-

- (1) Did the pus contain the Amoeba of Typentery,
- (2) Did the expectoration show evidence of a destructive process going in the Liver in the shape of Liver cells.

(5) Did the pus contain Tubercle bacille? To all of these questions, I received answers in the negative. Theract that your expectoration contained no amoebs, and showed no evidence of a destructive process going on in the Liver, aroused my suspicions that the whole of your trouble was really due to the appendicitie. I suggested to you, that possibly infection had spread up from the appendix, behind the large and up on to the upper and posterior surface of the Liver and that from there the pus had burst into t) lang.

If you will read Dr. Ryre's letter, you will see that from the bacteriological findings of the expectoration, and the results of treatment by vaccination with an organism, isolated from the pus, which resulted in a cure, he places the blame on the suppondix. If this be the solution of the origin of the abscess which burst into your lung, the fact that you have been vaccinated against it, makes you not more, but far less liable, then an ordinary individual returning to the tropics, to a fresh attack.
