What are the regulations under which these concessions are given? What is the land on which they bear?

I understand it to be unoccupied and unassigned land which is considered as the property of the State. Is this correct, and if so, where can I find the regulations which, under this head, govern British East African Protectorates, Uganda Protectorate and Northern Nigeria?

To what extent have concessions been granted in these Colonies.

Is there a general form of contract for these concessions? If so, is it possible to have a copy of same?

What measures are taken for the protection of the natives?

(If possible, I should be very pleased to obtain printed copies of the Regulations or Rules to which reference would be made, and I shall be glad to pay the cost of same).

form of contract
for these concusions, but
the Crown Land Orders
indicate the 2 lines
followed in them: and
in the larger ones
special clauses are en-
sured safeguarding
native rights.

6. As regards Northern Nigeria,
I am to repeat that it is not
the case that unoccupied and ungranted
land is considered as the property of the
state, the Concessions which it has
granted to the Royal Niger Company were acquired
and used in 1902, certain lands
which it took off the N.W. Nigeria

As regards Northern Nigeria
the Concessions have hitherto been
granted to the Royal Niger Company, but
now that the Royal Niger Company
has been dissolved, the Concessions
will be granted to the Government, in
order to facilitate the disposal
of land for agricultural pur-
