SUPERCULOSIS

Up to March 15th, no case of tuberculosis had occurred in the Protectorate, but on March 16th I conducted post mortems on two imported bulls which had reacted to tuberculin at Government Farm, Nainasha; in one case a small lesion resembling the early stage of tuberculosis was found, in one bullis, the tubercle was not demonstrated from the lesion and sections are being cut for microscopic examination.

In another case no visible tuberculous lesions were noticed, although the internal glands were in an extremely protracted condition, sections are also being cut from them.

On March 20th an imported bull half skins had reacted to tuberculin when slaughtered - and a very small lesion was found in one sub-mammary gland, however, the tubercle was not demonstrated from the skin and sections are being cut with a view

1900-1901, and I am now in a position to give you my opinion.

Every method which is not practicable needs to be given up. Veterinary bacteriology can never completely eliminate ill-health or disease from the animal cause, but in any event it would have to be considered whether it was worth while to try to cure the present existing condition.

I find that, under the present conditions, a bacteriologist is a necessary man, although he might be absent. I consider it would be England's best Veterinary practice to have a distinct section of the Veterinary Service and that a laboratory and apparatus would be organized for this section. By coincidence, Mr. H. D. Veterinary Bacteriological organization was suggested by the Surveyor of Health Bacteriologist in course which seems to have taken in the last fifteen years. Col. G. V. Veterinary Officer, who has organized a number of such a section in the Royal Veterinary College, London, and
