It is clear that Mr. Ward's proposals are developing into something in the nature of a concession telegraphed and signed.

So far he has secured permission to trade between His majesty's Boma, & to establish a trading station at Murchison Falls at Boma & Gauze Njoro, though this is not distinctly

stated in the papers.

He now wants a promise from F.O. to support an application to Monastir for leave to trade in Abyssinia; & while offering to enter into recognizances for £2000 as a pledge of good behaviour, he asks that no one else shall be allowed to enter the inland districts in which the Co. works without fulfilling the same conditions: and he wants this contained in a formal agreement.

I think that anything in the nature of a formal agreement is undesirable on the following grounds

1. The F.O. would never agree to limit themselves by contract to favor a certain line of action towards a foreign sovereign.

(2) Although the Govt. endeavours to prevent unauthorised people from entering the inland districts 288 it is very difficult to prevent them together: and if acceded into such an agreement as Ad. Black's to Abenegers, favoring not preventing most unauthorised entry.

(3). Other people such as Mr. Williams & Lord H. Ship have African tea traded in this country & they would complain if the condition of deferring £2000 were added - by enjoining them


(4). The question might be raised whether such an agreement is not in breach of the article of the Berlin Act prohibiting a monopoly or favor in matters of trade.

I think the agreement could be defended against and a Judge let F.O. Ad. I think, be consulted.

"Whatever view is taken I hope nothing will be done without giving the Govt., who will have to carry out the agreement of all, a full opportunity of exposing his views.

I have no prejudice against Mr. Ward or Mr. Morgan Harneyd upon their own moral tenets on the contrary from the first

Mr. Ward will no doubt be content with what we can give him with an informal enough as distinct from a formal agreement when he finds out to his satisfaction

that

Mr. Ward is still quite young & his proposals are not in themselves important. I deprecate the worth we is evidently accumulating. It is in my opinion most desirable - very undesirable that persons or companies trading in these districts

should be made to give substantial
security for good behavior. The
Marrow of S.A.P. extends throughout the
same. Such a condition might
seem to be imposed equally
on all persons, & I see no reason
why Lord Huddesfield should except
such a voluntary agreement.

The condition is dictated by
police law for our advantage.

But of course no formal agreement
of this kind is to be thought of.

I think I had better talk to

Sir,

I have the honour to request on behalf of the Boma Trading Company, that the following permissions, and the conditions thereof, that have been extended to us by H. M. Government may be condensed into the form of an agreement between H.M. Government and the Boma Trading Company on the following lines:-

Whereas

1. Permission has been granted to the Boma Trading Company to establish a trade route between Marsabit and Nairobi British East Africa.
2. To trade on the Juba River between Bardera and Kisimayu.
3. Establish permanent trading stations at Guaso Nyiro, Marsabit and Bardera.
4. And whereas the Foreign Office will extend their help and support, subject to the concurrence of the Colonial Office, to the Boma Trading Company with a view to their obtaining permission from the Negus Menelik of Abyssinia to trade in the Borana country.

The Boma Trading Company bind themselves.

1. To observe all the laws, bye-laws, rules, regulations and orders now, or at any future time, enforced by the Governor of the British East African Protectorate.
2. To carry on their business in a peaceful and legitimate manner, and to use all their influence towards the preservation of peace.

3. Not to trade by means of white men over the Anglo Abyssinian border until such time as they shall obtain the necessary permission from the Emperor Menelik as hereinbefore mentioned.
4. To furnish full reports to the Under Secretary of State on the Countries in which the Company works, and further reports on any subject that the Under Secretary of State may from time to time call upon them to render.
5. To enter into recognisances for the sum of £2,000 for the good behaviour of all their employees operating in the closed districts of the British East African Protectorate.

It is further agreed that all Companies and individuals desirous of entering, and trading in the closed districts of the Protectorate, in which the Company works, shall be required to furnish guarantees for the same amount, and on the same lines, as those furnished by the Boma Trading Company.
