East Africa and Italian Comaliland there are very few elephants remaining, and it is possible that the German and Italian Governments might be induced to adopt more stringent means to preserve the few that are left. Before, however, representations are made, it would appear desirable that we should ourselves adopt a consistent policy regarding the protection of elephants in Uganda and this Protectorate.
