In the present case Sir E. I am however to suggest for Lord Crewe's consideration that in executing works at the mouth of the new mould be an accretion of soil on one bank and a diminution on the other.

An instance of application being given in the case of a sudden change of channel to the general principles mentioned above is to be found in the Convention between the United States of America and Mexico of November 12th. 1884 relative to the Boundary formed by the rivers Colorado and Grande (see Moore's International Law, Volume I, page 760).

In the present case Sir E. Grey considers that more definite information is desirable but the change seems to have been of a sudden description as the river is leaving its old channel which is showing a tenden y to silt up. It appears to Sir E. Grey therefore that His Majesty's Government would be justified in claiming that the boundary line should follow the old bed and that the spot of sand now forming an island should remain British territory.

I am however to suggest for Lord Crewe's consideration that in executing works at the mouth of the new

channel care should be taken not to give the Italian Covernment any reason to complain that water is being diverted from the old channel by this means.

In the event of the Italian Government maintaining in the case now under discussion that the boundary should follow the new channel, His Lordship will no doubt further consider whether as a matter of general policy it may not be worth while to alter the frontier as an act of courtesy and grace, while upholding the general principle of international law stated above.
