Dept. With reference to your letter of 9th December, No.

38663/09 I am directed to inform you that travelling allowances are granted in certain cases to Subordinate Officers of the Government of India: the following are the main conditions under which they are granted:-

On appointment: Subordinates joining their first appointment are entitled to travelling allowances in certain specified cases, chiefly where a considerable journey is involved from place of recruitment to place of employment. In other cases travelling allowances may be granted by the Local Government or by other authority empowered by them to grant such allowances.

On transfer: Non-commissioned Officers on less than Rs. 200 a month, transferred to a station more than 200 miles distant may, if the transfer is for a period exceeding 3 months, receive allowances for conveyance of themselves,

and (up to a specified maximum) of their families and effects. Officers whose pay is less than Rs. 200 a month are, on transfer, as a rule, entitled to free passage by vessel for themselves and family. As regards inferior servants (i.e. employes, generally speaking, on less than Rs. 10 a month) it is laid down that they should not ordinarily be transferred, and there are no definite rules as regards the grant of travelling allowances in the case of their transfer.

Leave. Travelling allowances to officers proceeding on leave are only granted in a few specified instances, e.g. to non-Burmese Hospital Assistants employed in Burma and proceeding on sick leave, and (at the discretion of the Surveyor General) to subordinates in the Survey Department.

Similarly, in a few specified cases, Travelling Allowance is granted to subordinate officers on retirement.

The various rates of travelling allowance to which different classes of officers are entitled are fixed by rule.
