TELEGRAMS LONDON

Uganda Railway - Locomotives

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge your letter No. 16459/1908, of the 2nd May, of the disposal of certain locomotives of the Uganda Railway.

2. The only other railways in any of the Federated Malay States which are of the metre gauge are those of the Federated Malay States and in the Island of Singapore.

3. We would suggest that the Governor of the Straits Settlements should be communicated with and asked if a dozen of the Railways could be disposed of and supplied with locomotives for their lines.

4. I enclose copy of letter sent by Mr. T. C. Robertson to the Consul-General of the Straits Malay States Railways on 20th April, 1908, and a copy of his letter to Mr. K. M. Robertson.

1. We hope you are in communication with the Consulting Engineers for the Federal Malay States Railways, where the problem is the same as that of the Uganda Railway with a view to obtaining their advice as to what alterations should be furnished in the design of the locomotives.
2. We would like to receive the general weight of the engine, the wheelbase and height of the boiler, the diameter of the cylinder and cylinders, and the type of valve gear, as we believe these will be sufficient for your purposes.
3. The working vacuum has not been transmitted to us and we should be glad if you could supply us with the required information.
4. We should also be glad to receive any observations you may wish to offer on the Colonial Office letter.

Under these circumstances I have no objection to your taking Engineers for the steamer, and you will be at liberty to do so, which covers all expenses.

At the time right now we have no steamship to build, and the superintendence of these will be the choice left for the Civil Engineer. If this steamer has been lately added to our designing, the contracting for, and the supervision of the building of the steamer for lake service, the steamers previously built having been placed in the hands of a Marine Engineer. The design and contract for this steamer have occupied a great deal both of our own and of Mr. [unclear] our superior assistants' time, great care being required to avoid the excessive draught of the present steamers. We hope therefore that the cost will be thrown upon us, as well as our own time, will be considered as being outside the original agreement with us.
