

In the circumstances represented in Mr. Antrobus's letter of the 29 ultimo, I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to request you to convey to the Earl of Crewe their sanction for the appointment of Lieutenant Colonel Sir P. Girouard, K.C.I.I., D.S.O., R.E., at present Governor of Northern Nigeria, to be Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with a salary of £1,000 a year and an allowance of £1,000 a year, provided that this arrangement is considered personal to Sir P. Girouard.

I do so with pleasure feeling that you are the most suitable man for this important and not easy post and hoping that you may find time to go over the subject and say what you have in mind your work in Madras before you will take the responsibility of approaching the Secy. of the Colonial Off. if you will consent that the government do not stand by Sir J. Lugard and set up a committee or by yourself see an enquiry carrying a solid structure carried out on behalf of the Government and you would have equally substantial reasons to accept a transfer of his post. But we are in safety with the change which must make an agreeable one to you.

If we increase Dr. H. Bell's salary, I do
not see how we can refuse to increase also
the salary of Dr. A. Sharpe, the present
Resident of Nyasaland, who has held his appointment
as Resident Commr. - Compt. to the Govt. &
of Nyasaland for nearly 12 years
as against Dr. H. Bell's three years &
that is for Uganda. Dr. H. Bell is an
able official but so is Dr. A. Sharpe, & so
also is Capt. Cadenat, who has perhaps the


