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TREASURY CHAMBERS

Sir

I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Mr. Antrobus' letter of the 12th usuimo (10724/1909) relative to the need for a steamship service to replace the East Africa Protectorates Steamship "Juba" which has been condemned as unseaworthy.

In reply, I am to request you to remind the Earl of Crewe that in the Foreign Office letter of the 19th. December 1904 ("B") Their Lordships were informed that if the repairs then applied for were carried out, the "Juba" would not require anything of importance to be done to her for the next ten years. On the strength of this assurance My Lords agreed by Treasury Letter of 2nd February 1905 (1758/05) to the repairs being put in hand, at an estimated cost of £4400, which was ultimately increased to £5160. it is accordingly with regret that They now learn of the decision of the Secretary of State to sell the vessel as unseaworthy. They would be glad to be informed what are the circumstances through which the estimate of 1904 has proved so inaccurate, and whether any steps have been or are being taken to determine the responsibility for this serious miscalculation.

In the meantine My Lords are willing to consider what

The Under Secretary of State, Colonial Office. what means, can be adopted to meet the requirements of the British East Africa Protectorate in respect of a steamship service.

In the light of past exparience They are indisposed to entertain the question of the purchase or construction of a vessel to replace the Juba. They share the hope, moreover, of Their predecessors that the growth of the Protectorate's trade will at no very distant date suffice to attract the necessary shipping without any need for State assistance.

In these circumstances it appears to Their Lordships that, as is proposed by Lord Crewe, a temporary arrangement should be made, if possible, with some shipping firm or firms for carrying on the service performed by the "Juba", and They accordingly agree to the invitation of the necessary tenders by the Crown Agents for the Colonies.

As regards the term, They would prefer a yearly agreement, and think that in any case the period should not exceed four years.

My Lords understand that the duties of the "Juba" consisted principally in the carriage of mails and Government stores and passengers and in affording the necessary means of communication between the various towns upon the coast, and They consider that the new service should be primarily adapted to meeting these administrative requirements, and that the tenders should therefore provide for the use of a vessel of the size, speed, and carrying capacity of the "Juba" or a little larger.

The :

They gather, however, that the coastal trade has also hitherto, depended largely, in the absence of a regular Commercial service, upon the visits of the Government vessels, and if, on this ground, the Secretary of State should think it desirable to issue alternative tenders also, providing for a vessel of rather heavier type than that defined above, My bords will offer no objection to this course, on the clear understanding that if the tenders received show a serious discrepancy in cost between the provision of the lighter and the heavier vessel Their Lordships will not be prepared to sanction the additional expenditure involved by the latter.

I am to add that My Lords will be glad to be informed in due course how it is proposed to dispuse of the staff of the "Juba".
