Lord Wolseley correctly apprehends the effect
of the proposal made to him in conversation
on the 5th of March.

Three proposals have now been made to him
in the matter of Capital expenditure -

A \$1000000 spent on permanent improvements
in 5 years.

As he said this was overseas

B Not less than £3000 to be spent in each
of the first 3 years on experimental &
laboratory work followed by ~~expensive~~
improvements in the next five years to
the amount of one tenth of the area taken

up.
This did not satisfy him, we have now offered C
C. a reduction of the preliminary expenditure accompanied by an increase of the expenditure on permanent improvements on the following scale

To be spent on exploratory & experimental work in each of the first 3 years.

not less than £ 2000
£ 1500

To be spent on permanent improvements within 5 years

60 times the rent
£ 0

B or C work out as follows according to the amount of land taken up at the end of the exploratory period of three years:-

If we ~~will~~ ~~will~~ be seen that it is only when the amount of land eventually chosen gets to a very high figure that the total expenditure originally suggested is exceeded. On the other hand, the expenditure can be spread out over a greater number of years; and ~~and~~ because the Company have the privilege of picking out the best land before they commit themselves to any expenditure on permanent improvements. Under Scheme C. they are given the chance of shifting the balance of their expenditure from the worked exploration, from which they can expect no direct & definite return, to the worked permanent improvement, from which, if they are in earnest, they have everything to hope. I don't see that we can do more to meet them. We should pin them down to one of these three schemes definitely & not give any option to shift from one to the other of them.

○ I inform Lord Wolseley that he has correctly stated the proposal made to him; point out, as above, the advantages offered by

a few terms proposals made, & says that
Lord Crewe is willing that he should choose
either of these proposals, or the original
proposal of an expenditure of £10,000 within
5 years; but that he cannot see his way
to offer any other terms or to allow an
option to change from one scheme to another
after the conclusion of the agreement.

Government that we prefer to adhere to their conditions of 29th August, 1908, under which we are required to spend in all £16,000 within 5 years. The only other proposal I can think of is that we stand on your proposal of August 29th 1908, requiring a total expenditure of £16,000 towards which we shall spend one-third namely £5,300 in the first three years and thereafter if we wish to avail ourselves of the whole or any part of the Concession the minimum we shall further expend to be the difference between £5,300 and £16,000 in other words £10,700.

In this manner we shall be risking £5,300 with the certain knowledge that we have to spend a further £10,700 whether we finally decide on selecting and renting only say 5,000 acres or the whole.

This offer is a great modification of any of our former counter proposals and beyond which I really do not see that we should be justified in going

2. The proposal for Chittagong in re-
gard to capital expenditure:

(B) Not less than £1000 to be spent in
each of the first three years of ex-
penditure and each year only followed by
expenditure on permanent improvement in

expenditure does not exceed

ture of survey, to be spent in the first year of the
expenditure on permanent improvements
on the following order:
