Since my return from the Miviers, 10 days ago, I never carefully considered your last letter. Your proposals, if you will allow me to say so, are in my opinion far too complicated, and I therefore acception that it would be best on the whole if we revert to your original proposal of subscribing \$16,000 in respect of the whole area of 126,000 wores, which have now been reduced to 100,000.

The only modification I wish to suggest is that after naving then a minimum of ££,000 in the first three years, we shall be at liberty to terminate the agreement and only retain such of the land as has been actually cultivated. By reasons for reggesting the rounce lies in the uncertainty of the value of the land which income left to as, after the deduction of ££,000 cores— has preliminary step the area has been inspected.
