These fibre areas are in an entirely  
different category from lands in the  
highlands or we better we hope to  
get the title-sellers, and the money  
there will be <sup>(long term)</sup> better for the country.

for white occupation, & can only be  
exploited on the "plantation" system  
by people or companies possessing large  
capital & employing native labour.

In 9 last reported in 1904 (743378) the  
Chilanga claim was granted for the collection  
of fibre. There is a history of this in the  
agreement as it stands, and it appears  
from 252167 that land is being planted now  
in cotton. This is an act the magnificence

thereafter for 10 years of the Co's due to be on

My Lord,

I have the honour to report that on April 24th 1908 an application was received on behalf of the Deutsche-Englische Ost Afrika Kompagnie Limited for 50 square miles of land at Voi for the purpose of exploiting fibre.

2. This Company had already taken over Mr. Huebner's grants consisting of 50 square miles at Kibwezi and 35 square miles at Voi, on which a report was sent to Your Lordship in Sir James Hayes Sadler's despatch No. 225 of June 10th 1907. Satisfactory development had taken place on both properties but it was found that the area at Voi was not large enough to enable the fibre to be worked profitably and accordingly the application for a further grant was made.

3. Sir James Hayes Sadler had no objections and Your Lordship's approval would have been sought at the time had it not been discovered that there were previous applications affecting the land in question which prevented any steps being taken.
