

22nd August, 1910.

My dear Read:-

There is a young man here in the Eastern Telegraph Company named Grace whom I was very anxious to secure as one of our Assistant Collectors here but the Foreign Office in the plenitude of its wisdom decided to fill the two vacant posts with a gentleman who has spent all his life in looking after merchant seamen at Havre and one, who for some unknown reason, has retired from the Navy.

He tells me that he applied to the Colonial Office in November 1909 for an assistant district commissionership in East Africa.

I do not think you could do better than him. He is inured to all sorts of climates. I know Arabic and Swahili and, quite unlike most officials I know, takes a great interest in all of things connected with the country - but not connected immediately with his work - such as birds, beasts and insects and so forth.


