experience that dentists are
necessary for East Africa,
where teeth are all important
subject to very serious deterioration
under heat & dirt but Frithauf
travels at Govt. expense to see
to the men's teeth - in what

no local practitioners.

We give our officers free
medical attendance in the P.M.
but not on leave & it might
seem to follow from this that
we should also grant them
free dental treatment in the P.M.

that the whole of this dental question should
be looked into by the E. Afr. Affairs Bureau
& Sanitary etc. We have dealt with the
question of the steps to be taken to
bring all candidates on post app^t
shall have their teeth put in order

must be constantly occurring in our African
columns where men's teeth forming a shame,
under existing arrangements, they are
unable to have them seen to in good time.

My Lord,

I have the honour to refer for Your Lordship's decision a request which has been submitted to me for the payment by Government of a dentist's fee for services rendered to a Non Commissioned Officer of the Royal Engineers employed in the Survey Department.

2. It appears that during the South African War such services were given free to Non Commissioned Officers and men of the Army and, as the climate of this Protectorate has a distinctly deleterious effect on the teeth, a similar concession might perhaps be granted here, though the circumstances are not precisely similar, as military pay only was drawn in the former case.

3. It is, however, very possible that the question has been raised and decided in some other Colony, and if this is the case I should be glad to know the nature of the
