My Lord,

It has recently been brought to my notice that members of the non-European Staff taking their leave in India very frequently obtain extensions on medical certificates from doctors resident in Goa, who take a more serious view of their patients' state of health than would perhaps be thought necessary by a Government Medical Officer. Quite lately a clerk was recommended by the practitioner attending him for fifteen days extra leave on the ground that he was suffering from a severe attack of malarial fever; yet in two days he had recovered sufficiently to be able to attend his own wedding.

2. There are many other cases, in which we have had

our suspicions but have been unable to verify them.

3. It has been suggested that all applicants for extension of leave on medical certificate should appear before the Protectorate Medical Officer at Bombay, but this would scarcely be fair in genuine cases of sickness, where the journey might be prejudicial to the patient's health.

4. I would however propose that in order to minimize the inducement to obtain an extension, $\frac{1}{2}$ pay only be granted in such cases instead of $\frac{1}{3}$ pay as at present. This would be quite reasonable, as half pay is drawn during the ordinary course of leave and it is usual to make some difference when additional leave is granted on medical certificate.

5. I have therefore the honour to request Your Lordship's permission to make the necessary alteration in Section 9 of the Proposed Terms of Service for members of the Permanent Clerical Staff. The Acting Governor

of Uganda concurs with the recommendation.
