I can only regard this telegram as part of a settled campaign on the part of Sir P. Girouard & Co. to force the S. of B. into agreeing not to enter into any negotiations in this country with regard to purchases made by P. P. He is clearly discredited with the very responsible attitude taken up by S. & B.

Only in glor. 11. 1922

matter be settled locally we cannot  
refuse to consider representations made  
to him in this connection, though he will only  
do so in full consultation with the local  
authorities.

The Governor's attitude in the present  
instance appears to me untenable. Negotia-  
tions for this concession were opened  
as long ago as 1906 at the instance  
of the then Govt. after prolonged cor-  
respondence, in the course of which the  
local Govt was afforded every opportunity  
of expressing its opinion; an agreement  
to lease was duly executed in April  
1909 (copy in C.G. 12839/09) the concessionaries  
complied with the terms of the agreement,  
and the lease was formally granted  
in April last (copy in C.G. 2468). We cannot  
now, either in law or equity, go to the  
Company & say that they shall issue  
no advertisement or prospectus  
relating to the lands leased because  
certain native rights exist which cannot  
be exactly determined, promptly for

years to come. We can only rely on  
clause 16 of the lease, which forbids  
interference with lands occupied or  
cultivated by natives or in which  
natives have rights, & on clause 33 which  
describes the customary rights of natives.  
In fact we are not in a position to  
object to the issue of any advertisement  
or prospectus not only to us but to  
advertisers or prospectus, since  
transgress the terms of the lease.

A reply on the former part, as the  
lease has actually been granted, it is  
not open to the Govt to object to  
the issue of any advertisement or  
prospectus unless it can be shown
